Engineers edge Colby in Centennial game, 29-28

With sophomore quarterback Bob Baron directing a surprisingly strong ground attack, Rensselaer came from behind to edge Colby, 20-28, and win its first football trophy in its 98 years of college football. The trophy was given in honor of the Contennial game held at Rensselaer to celebrate college football's first 100 years.

Steve LaMore, the Engineer's starting quarterback, played a solid game. He completed 14 of 22 passes for 164 yards and moved the team well on the ground. However, Baron replaced LaMore in the third period. He completed five of ten passes for 106 yards, but it was his running, 12 carries for 44 yards which sparked the Rensselaer offense. Rick Tesmer ran up 112 yards on the ground while Thad Ostrowski gained 56, it was one of Rensselaer's most productive displays of rushing in four years.

Played flawlessly

Rensselaer showed no major weakness in the game, but the secondary was never tested. The offensive line composed of Gary Cluen, Dave Walsh, Paul Brunning, Ed Dassatti, and Randy Edwards played flawlessly while the defensive line and linebackers played almost as well.

Colby's total offense consisted of a running quarterback and three running backs. The White Mules, received the ball to open the game and on the very first play, Brian Cone, the Colby quarterback, went around end for a 77 yard touchdown. The kick failed and Colby led, 6-0.

On the ground

Colby scored again following Thad Ostrowski's fumble at the Colby 34, Colby moved the ball all the way on the ground. The two-point conversion was disallowed because Colby had an illegal receiver downfield.

Following the kickoff Rensselaer finally got untracked and moved to the Colby four yard line. It was first and goal to go from the four, but the offense couldn't score.

Colby brought the ball back upfield to the Rensselaer 39 where the Engineers again took possession.

This time the Engineers mounted a scoring drive. LaMore threw to Rich Kelly for 38 yards and Rick Tesmer carried for 17 more yards to set up the score. Larry Fairchild kicked the first of his three points.

Engineer lines

Throughout the game the Engineer lines played exceptionally. Colby managed only one successful drive against the defense, the other three scores coming on two 77-yard runs and an 81-yard punt return. The offensive line protected La More and Baron perfectly and sprung the running backs successfully.

At the opening of the third period, Colby widened their lead to 28-7 on two spectacular plays. The first was a 81yard punt return, the second a 77-yard run from scrimmage by Ron Lupton.

After turning the ball over to Colby on an interception, the Engineers got it back and went 80 yards on the ground for the score. Baron directed this drive, his first of the game. The score was now 28-14.

The third period ended without further score. The fourth quarter got underway with the Engineers in possession of the

ball. But the drive was stopped at the 50-yard line. Colby was immediately stopped by the Rensselaer defense. The ensuing Colby punt wound up on the Colby 32. The Engineers had gained 18 yards with the defense on the field, But on the first play, the Engineers drew a holding penalty. That effectively killed the drive.

Colby got the ball back, but the defense stymied the White Mules and on the punt return Bill Curran ran the ball back to the Colby 29. With seven minutes left, and behind by 14 points the Engineers had to score on that drive to have any chance of getting the ball back with any time left.

The drive got underway hesitantly with Tesmer being dropped for an eleven-yard loss after a lateral from Baron. After a one-yard gain, it was fourth and 14. But Baron found Rich Kelly at the 25 yard line and he moved to the six.

Broken play

In three plays Tesmer brought the ball down to the one-yard line. On fourth down, a hand-off between Baron and Ostrowski was missed. It wound up look-


ing like a good fake. The Colby defense converged on Ostrowski and Baron went in untouched around left end.


With the score 28-21 Colby, the obvious onside kick came and failed. But the Engineer defense stopped Colby cold. The Engineers took over on their own 19 yard line. The offense mov-4 the ball to the 50 on a seven yard line plunge by Tesmer, a 10 yard run by Baron, and a 12 yard pass to Kelly.

Two more plays netted only two yards. Baron then threw a screen pass to Ostrowski, who zigzagged 50 yards for the touchown. There seemed to be no doubt to the 4000 fans as what to do. Baron rolled to right on an option play, then put his head down and ran to the end zone. A Colby line-backer stopped him momentarily at the one, but Baron bowled the guy over for the two point conversion. The outcome; Rensselaer 29—Colby 28.

Bob Baron, sophomore quarterback for Rensselaer, was named today as ECAC Sophomore of the Week.

Baron came into the game against Colby in the third quarter and engineered three touchdown drives to lead the Engineers in the 29-28 victory.






Athlete of the Week

For his performance, Saturday, against Colby, Olympia has chosen quarterback Bob Baron as Athlete of the Week.





Weighing-in at 165 pounds, Deacon may fill out a little but he probably won't grow much more. Still, he is already a lot of dog.




crowd was unruly due to their impatience and disrupted the proceedings many times. In past years the carnival of all three nights was kept in line and the serious issues were presented cogently.

Class officers




JACK HART

For his outstanding performance against the Coast Guard Academy, Jack Hart has been named Athlete of the Week by Olympia.



Hart is a senior majoring in management and is a brother of Theta Chi fraternity.



G.A.S. closed out the scoring in the final period when Turner netted his second goal from about ten feet out after receiving a centering pass.



RPI Man Designs Police Insignia Bearing U.S. Flag

In an age when many college campuses are the scenes of violence and demonstrations and when students at many universities are crying "police brutality" and continually desecrate

the U.S. Flag as well as use obscenities toward veterans organizations a different atmosphere exists in Troy among its local police, RPI students and at least one veterans group.

This is due to some degree because of a joint effort expended by the traffic division of the Trov Police Dept., an architectural student at RPI and the C.R.A.B. Post, Veterans of Troy.

Sgt. Robert L. Pasinella, with the aid of Gregory Seleman of RPI and the veterans organization came up with an idea of an insignia for members of his traffic division and he wanted to adopt the American flag as part of the official insignia "simply because of the way the flag is being desecrated throughout the country today-and especially on our college campuses."

The police sergeant took his "idea" to Gregory Seleman, an RPI architectural student, whose home residence is East Hartford, Conn.

Have Aided Police

Seleman is a member of Theta Chi Fraternity, one of the fraternities at RPI which has aided the police department in the past in joint ventures such as assisting in the annual Hallo-

ween parade.

The RPI student then drew an insignia with Sgt. Pasinella's "ingredients." The policeman submitted the drawing along with a letter to City Manager Ralph A. DeSantis with the recommendation of Police Chief James W. Doherty and the suggestion for an insignia was approved.

The insignia is in the process of being made now and orders have been placed for all 10 members of the epartment's traffic division staff.

The patch will be wirn on the left shoulder contrasting with the traffic division patch

worn on the other shoulder. Sgt. Pasinella said the flag denotes unity while the traffic light in the insignia denotes the traffic division,

He also said that some local police departments in the state have a flag as their insignia but that Troy is the first to place the flag on as part of the official patch.

It was on the bus ride back from St. Lawrence last fall, after the Engineers succumbed to a second-half Larrie upsurge and lost 41-6, that certain things became more evident as to the prospects of Rensselaer football. I was on that bus listening to Coach Riendeau reflect upon the concluding football season and hopes for the following year.

What Riendeau said, although quite an important commentary on the strengths and weaknesses of his squad, could have been set aside if one had noticed the reserved optimism still maintained by a coach whose team had been badly beaten only a few hours ago. Chatting with his coaches and players, he displayed on this occasion an intangible asset so often lacking on many teams - a distinct rapport with members on the squad.

Vindication Despite the final score that afternoon, the players tried

relentlessly to vindicate themselves against St. Lawrence for a terribly disappointing season. The following weekend in an illcared-for contest the Engineers closed out their slate with a 35-7 loss to Hobart earning them an unenviable 1-7-1 record

Springtime

While spring is the time when most coaches of big-time football powers are scurrying around the practice field in an attempt to obtain a pre-season insight into their squad's abilities, Riendeau is busy recruiting and handling departmental chores. Rensselaer, like the Ivies, is not allowed under ICAC rules to foster coach instructed spring practice. The players must manage on their own.

For over a week now, many of the eighty-odd candidates trying out for the team have been practicing on the athletic fields. In addition, Riendeau has instituted a testing program designed to measure certain physical abilities such as speed, quickness, and power. He found that fourteen of the top twentytwo tested were people who had not played varsity football before, a figure that includes freshmen. Riendeau indicated that he will lean heavily on the results of the test which had been invented by a professor from the University of Indiana.

Superstars

Springtime

While spring is the time when most coaches of big-time football powers are scurrying around the practice field in an attempt to obtain a pre-season insight into their squad's abilities, Riendeau is busy recruiting and handling departmental chores. Rensselaer, like the Ivies, is not allowed under ICAC rules to foster coach instructed spring practice. The players must manage on their own.

For over a week now, many of the eighty-odd candidates trying out for the team have been practicing on the athletic fields. In addition, Riendeau has instituted a testing program designed to measure certain physical abilities such as speed. quickness, and power. He found that fourteen of the top twentytwo tested were people who had not played varsity football before, a figure that includes freshmen. Riendeau indicated that he will lean heavily on the results of the test which had been invented by a professor from the University of Indiana.

the defensive coordinator next year replacing Dan Campbell who has taken a leave or apsence. Ducatte is presently the varsity baseball coach and last season coached the freshmen gridders. He will be coaching basically the same defenses, the 4-3-4, and 4-4-3 with an additional eight man front alignment. Ducatte will have his work cut out for him as Riendeau commented on last year's defense. "We were very weak outside and our entire defense was poor." A smaller but quicker front four is anticipated with possibly greater ability to rush the passer.

Recalling that the Engineers lose many potential players to the Ivy League for a variety of reasons, Riendeau feels that the football program is reaching its saturation point with available talent without resorting to athletic scholarships. On the basis of what he has done recruiting, Riendeau concluded 'I can stand on what we can do in the next two years."



Athlete of the Week



He also intercepted three passes in holding the Union passing game to minus eleven yards. He was nominated to E.C.A.C. team of the week by Coach Riendeau.









Athlete of the Week


